




# CRANE CREEK GYMNASIUM

## PARKS

Throughout the years, each park has developed a wide range of activities, classes and programs for all ages, with a main focus on families and young children. Providing a safe environment where families can enjoy themselves is essential to our mission as an agency.

### *Health and Wellness Initiatives*

We hear more and more research about the obesity epidemic in our country and according to the America's Health Ranking and United Health Foundation, South Carolina ranks 46th in the nation. This is why our parks were challenged to offer educational health and wellness programs over the past year. Each park chose a wellness initiative that brought awareness to a health or social issue that was affecting their particular community. From National Youth Violence Prevention, National Children's Day, Healthy Weight Week to National Pancreatic Cancer Awareness, the parks worked with local organizations and experts to make each event informative and educational for everyone.

### *Events*

We continue to host other premiere events that have grown in popularity over the years. The 31st Annual Snowman 8K Road Race and Youth Fun Run held in January 2012 was a huge success with over 200 runners participating. Through key partnership with Verizon Wireless and Firehouse Subs the agency was able to introduce two new events. The Hispanic Heritage Festival, which was sponsored by Verizon Wireless offered the community a chance to enjoy the Hispanic culture through food and activities. Firehouse Subs assisted the agency in organizing the Fire Safety Jubilee that offered tips on fire safety to kids and adults.

### *Pools*

We now manage three aquatic facilities: Hopkins Park pool, Trenholm Park pool and St. Andrews Park pool. Every summer, residents flock to our pools for relief from the summer heat. Swimming lessons are offered for children and adults, as well as lifeguard training and certification classes. With safety in mind, a free water safety training day is held for anyone who wants to attend.

# PROGRAMMING DIVISION

## *Afterschool*

The RCRC Programming Division includes Afterschool and Summer Camp programs, Adaptive Recreation, Adult Services and Community Centers.

The Afterschool program has expanded to six locations and includes additional educational and enrichment programs. Each site has specific enrichment programs that include computer technology, health and wellness and physical activity; all of which will be offered during summer camps.

In March 2012, five of our afterschool programs participated in training sessions to learn a new CPR method. The American Red Cross introduced a new hands only method called Citizen's CPR. The method is simple, requiring quick chest compressions until emergency

personnel can get to the scene. The kids were taught to always call 9-1-1 first but that they can use the method to help someone in distress until medical staff arrives.



## *21st Century Community Learning Grant*

We continued our partnership with JP Thomas Elementary School and the 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant. The program serves about 40 children throughout the school year. With the grant funding we are able to provide children with access to technology and educational expertise that can help improve overall test scores and grades.

## *Adaptive Recreation*

The Adaptive Recreation department creates activities and athletics tailored for children and adults with intellectual and physical challenges.



The agency has been on the forefront of adaptive athletics and we have created unique opportunities for residents with special needs.

Through fundraising efforts the agency was able to purchase an adaptive golf cart to be used at LinRick Golf Course. David Stringer, Director of Human Resources, had a spinal cord injury as a teen. He's active in many wheelchair sports including basketball and tennis, but taking on golf was a challenge. With the assistance of the new golf cart, David was able to hit a golf ball for the first time.

## *Adult Services*

Our two Adult Activity Centers offer wellness programs, health screenings and fitness classes for adults 21 and up. Our staff works hard to create credible, educational and informational programs for our aging population that

includes day trips for adults and our annual Midlands Area Senior Games, a week-long Olympic style event.

During the summer an outdoor concert series called "Kool Jazz in the Park" is held at the Parkline Adult Activity Center. Families gather to enjoy local jazz groups. These great concerts have become increasingly more popular.



## *Community Centers*

Our community centers offer a place for members of the community to gather for a broad range of

group activities and events that create a positive leisure experience. One such activity was developed through a partnership with the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control. Over 20 healthy cooking workshops were held this past year.



# FOUNDATION



In 2012, the Richland County Recreation Foundation set a goal to increase its funding opportunities by broadening its outreach to include corporate sponsorships. This brought more awareness to the business community about the positive impact of recreation. Not only was the attention placed on the physical benefits, but the social benefits as well. There is a constant need for additional funding to continue to provide the exceptional level of service the patrons have come to expect from RCRC programs and services.

The Foundation was able to gain additional support in the business community by offering naming rights opportunities at our facilities, parks and fields. Naming rights allow companies to both advertise their business as well as show the local community their commitment to improving the overall health of the people who live there. Local businesses also have the opportunity to set up scholarships for children and seniors who need assistance in paying for programs and services.

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of South Carolina became the first corporation to make a 3 year commitment of \$15,000 by purchasing naming rights for athletic fields. The funding will go towards

programming, services or infrastructure needs. Dick Dyer Toyota committed \$1,000 to fund scholarships for families that need financial assistance. Scholarships can be used for any program, class or athletic league run by the Recreation Commission.

RCRF is committed in its role to bringing awareness to the growing obesity epidemic and we were fortunate

to take part in and become a member of the SC Medical Association Childhood Obesity Task Force to develop solutions to combat the problem.



The Foundation also kicked off its ongoing Buy-A-Brick campaign to fill the courtyard of the new RCRC Administration building with personalized bricks from people who have supported the agency or used our facilities. The bricks provide an additional funding source but also a way for people to have their names etched in stone for many years to come. All of the proceeds raised by the Richland County Recreation Foundation go directly to programming, services and infrastructure needs.

# COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The RCRC motto is “Community First.” We have many ways that we fulfill this motto but one of the key ways is to have direct communication with our patrons and the communities we serve.

## *Recreation Enrichment Committees*

In 2011, we reorganized our community advisory councils, now known as Recreation Enrichment Committees, (RECs). Each one of our staffed facilities has a patron committee which are a great way for community members to get involved with their park or community center. RECs have the ability to raise funds for their facility and act as a liaison to RCRC staff.

## *Volunteers*

The Community Relations Department is also responsible for managing the Volunteer and Internship program. Many area universities and colleges have recreation or sports management fields of study and those students wanting to pursue a career in recreation or sports management have a great opportunity to have hands on working experience with our staff. Each intern can develop an overall idea of how a large agency, like RCRC, operates. Having volunteers helps offset operational costs for many of our facilities. From our youngest to oldest volunteer, they all have the same goal, giving back to the community. We have a wide-range of volunteer opportunities, from coaching to Foster Grandparents, high school and college students volunteering with our afterschool and summer camp programs.

## *National Recreation Month*

Not only is our job to put “Community First,” it’s also our job to promote the importance of recreation in our area. The month of July is designated as National Recreation Month. Each year the National Recreation and Park Association develops contests and activities which are geared towards encouraging the public to explore their local parks. This year we participated in the “Get Wild” initiative. We hid several geocaches throughout our facilities around the county.



Geocaching is a fun, outdoor activity where GPS coordinates are used to find a treasure or cache. Once the cache is found, the treasures inside are for the hunter to keep. RCRC caches included coupons for classes, RCRC trinkets and fun toys.

## *Communications*

How we communicate with our patrons is important and with such a vast age-range and large area to cover, RCRC has to stay up-to-date on all forms of communication. Our website is our most important tool when informing the public about the agency’s programs and activities. Besides our front line staff, our website is the first place patrons go to get park information. We updated the look of our website and created a more user-friendly interface, making it easier to search for your local park and the programs that it offers. It also features the park of the month and gives us the ability to highlight programs. Along with our website, we encourage our patrons to subscribe to our monthly e-newsletter, *TimeOut*. We also utilize social media, as it is a fun and interactive way to reach our public, quickly and easily. Our patrons have the opportunity to be our “fan” on Facebook and follow us on Twitter.

# ATHLETICS

## *Youth Track and Field*

This past year was a huge success for our track program. RCRC was represented in two national track and field events and one young man brought home RCRC's first ever national title. Nine teens attended the 45th USATF National Junior Olympic Track and Field event in Wichita, Kansas. Charles Mack, 14, finished 7th in the boys 100m dash and the boys 4x100 relay team finished 5th. Another team travelled to Hershey, Pennsylvania for the Hershey National Track

and Field event. D'Andre Harley, 14, brought home the national title in the boys 200m dash, making him RCRC's first national title winner in a track and field event. Along with D'Andre, Arlicia Bush, 13, finished 2nd in the girls 200m; Jamia Syrkett, 13, was 6th in the girls standing long jump and the boys 4x100 relay team finished 4th.



## *Youth Basketball*

RCRC hosted the South Carolina Athletic Programs (SCAP) state basketball tournament for boys and girls, 12 and under. RCRC was represented in both divisions with teams from the East Columbia Basketball League. The girls defeated Central Clemson to win the state title. The boys played hard but didn't make it to the finals. RCRC hopes to continue to host the tournament in the future.

## *Youth Tennis*

The interest in tennis has continued to grow and with the addition of our Tiny Tots Tennis and other beginner programs, we've reached an even younger group of kids. We offer a youth tennis league in the spring and fall and hundreds of children are exposed to this great sport. With the completion of the new Richland County Tennis Center, resurfaced courts and other new amenities, hundreds of kids and families have enjoyed this sport.



# AWARD WINNING STAFF



RCRC was the first and has been the only recreation agency in South Carolina to be nationally accredited by the Commission for Accreditation of Recreation and Park Agencies (CAPRA).

National accreditation requires a comprehensive review of all policies, procedures, finance and operational management. There are only 100 agencies nationwide that are CAPRA accredited. Each accredited agency must go through a renewal process every five years and in July 2011, a CAPRA review team visited the Recreation Commission. They saw first hand how we operate and visited several of our facilities. We are pleased to say that in November 2011 at the National Recreation and Park Association's Exposition and Congress, RCRC was reaccredited for CAPRA. Our management staff and commissioners were in attendance to accept this prestigious honor.



The Richland County Recreation Commission employs 150 full-time staff and about 200 seasonal and part-time staff. It's important to highlight and recognize our staff for the outstanding job that they do. Year round park staff plan and implement programming. Our custodial and maintenance staff keep our parks clean on the inside and the grounds well maintained on the outside. Not only do we recognize an

employee each quarter and choose an employee of the year but some of our employees are recognized for their work at the state level. The South Carolina Recreation and Park Association (SCRPA) gave the distinct honor of Professional of the Year to our very own Mr. Ronnie Kinnett. Mr. Kinnett has worked for the agency for over 30 years, mostly in our facility management division, overseeing construction projects, facility maintenance and property management. Being recognized by other recreation professionals throughout the state is a huge honor and we are grateful for Mr. Kinnett's dedication to recreation in Richland County.

Each quarter an RCRC employee is chosen by their co-workers. Our honorees this year demonstrate the pride and dedication that our staff take in their work.

# ROSENWALD SCHOOL

The story has been told many times throughout the past few years but our staff and the former students never tire of hearing the examples of hard work and determination that went into the restoration of a symbol of tougher times in Richland County.

The restoration of the Pine Grove Rosenwald School was an important project, not only for the agency but for the surrounding community and former students. It is unimaginable to think that one of these historic school buildings had fallen into disrepair and was on the verge of being demolished. The Pine Grove school was built in 1923 and is one of more than 5,300 schools and ancillary buildings in the country constructed as part of the Rosenwald program; the vision of Booker T. Washington, then principal of the Tuskegee Institute and Julius Rosenwald, president of Sears, Roebuck and Company.

The school was one of 15 built in Richland County and is the last one still standing and restored. Over the years, the community would use the old building for meetings and gatherings, but many neighbors say they had no idea of the historic background of the building. So over time, the building needed repairs. The community and neighbors did what they could, but ultimately it fell into such disrepair, they just locked the doors.

Fast forward to 2004, the construction for a new community center was underway and thoughts about what to do with the old building were leaning towards demolition. After several meetings with the community, several former students that attended the school suggested the restoration and future museum of the building. The restoration process began in 2007 and with the assistance of Kevin Fogle, a graduate student from the University of South Carolina, the Pine Grove school was officially added to the National Register of Historic places in January 2009.



Rosenwald Schools across the nation were listed on the National Trust for Historic Preservation's America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places, elevating the importance of the project.

Funding for the project came from various preservation organizations and the total cost of the project was approximately \$144,000. Funds were acquired from the former State Competitive Grants program, the Lowe's Home Improvement Charitable and Educational Foundation Preservation fund and the Richland County Conservation Commission. The project was managed by the Richland County Recreation Foundation.

The school is furnished with desks and other items from the era when the school was in operation. Many items were donated so that the school can be used in connection with surrounding schools as a field study location for students.

The project was completed in November 2011 and during the grand opening and open house, former students gathered and reminisced on the importance of their time in school there. Photos, furniture and other items brought back wonderful memories of their childhood, as tough as it was. This local treasure will teach many future generations the lessons of the past.



## SPECIAL EVENTS

The 43rd annual *Cottontail Festival* welcomed thousands of patrons and their children. With live entertainment, food, Easter egg hunts for all ages and tons of arts and crafts, families have made this event an annual spring outing.

Over the summer, we revived the favorite summer enrichment program, *Showtime Carousel*. The monthly performance showcase featured local magician, John Tudor, an African dance and drums troupe and a performance by our partners at the Columbia Children's Theatre. *Showtime Carousel* exposes children of all ages to the wonders of local performing arts.

We kick off the holiday season with one of our most popular events. *Breakfast with Santa* brings hundreds of families to Richland Mall to have a photo taken with Santa, breakfast from Chick-fil-A and a special performance from the Columbia Children's Theatre.



## Being Green is easy!

The RCRC Green Team is made up of RCRC staff and it's goal is to ensure RCRC facilities are as 'green' and environmentally friendly as possible. With the assistance of Sonoco Recycling, we implemented a new recycling program in our administrative offices and parks. All staff are encouraged to recycle paper, aluminum and plastic. We also have several designated parks that take in extra recyclable materials.

Our Green Team also got involved with the Great American Clean-up program. The team and community members got together over the summer for three clean-up days. We picked up over 30 lbs of trash and were part of keeping our communities and parks clean and safe for everyone. We've also partnered with Keep the Midlands Beautiful for their Grinding of the Greens campaign. After the holidays, Christmas trees can be dropped off at six of our locations and then ground into mulch which is then used to beautify our parks.



# FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The Commission is funded through county property taxes with the exception of LinRick Golf Course, which is funded through fees and services generated at the golf course. Property taxes and all recreation bonds are approved by Richland County Council.

The Commission had an operational budget of \$13,422,093 (\$13,194,453 in 10/11) and ended the year with a balance in the undesignated General Maintenance and Operations Fund of \$5,047,825 (\$5,279,721 in 10/11).

The General Fund reflects all financial activity of the agency for the exception of LinRick Golf Course.

The fund had a total final operating budget of \$12,622,787 (\$12,409,906 in 10/11), with actual expenditures including direct costs of programs of \$13,197,571 (\$12,134,937 in 10/11).

Total revenue recorded in the General Fund was \$12,934,916 with 86.5% from property taxes, 12.5% from programs, and 1% from interest, grants and other sources.


Of total revenue, property taxes generated \$11,122,721 and \$70,339 came from the Merchandise's Inventory Tax. Revenue in the General Fund from activity fees decreased to \$1,619,654.

Other sources of revenue included \$152,961 in interest, grants and other sources. These additional resources were used to fund special activities and programs offered by the Recreation Commission and for park improvements.

The total operating budget for the year for LinRick Golf Course, a separate proprietary fund, was \$799,306. Receipts from greens fees, rentals, pro shop, driving range, and concessions for the year in the LinRick Fund increased to \$815,990.


RICHLAND COUNTY RECREATION COMMISSION

## GENERAL FUND




RICHLAND COUNTY RECREATION COMMISSION

## PROPRIETARY FUND (LinRick Golf Course)




RICHLAND COUNTY RECREATION COMMISSION
